9	Todd Rossow, who is our Conference Vice Chair and my
10	right-hand man. Belinda Clifton, who is our Lead
11	Parliamentarian. Courtney Halbrook, who is our
12	Council II Chair. I have already introduced Todd. He
13	also was our proxy for Council I. Dr. Chip Manuel, who
14	is our Vice Chair for Council III, but is sitting in for
15	Dr. Shaffner today. Cliff Nutt, who is Executive
16	Treasurer. Chirag Bhatt, who is our Resolutions
17	Committee Chair. And then Michael Antee is up here to
18	Belinda with our count today.
19	Okay. So with those introductions, I
20	first want to say congrats. You guys did it. We
21	finished the week. Can you believe it? Yay. Yay. I
22	want to say how proud I am. The vibe of this year's
23	conference I would say is nothing like I've ever seen.
24	I think we were ready. We were ready to be here
25	together. It was collaborative. It was kind. It was

25 together. It was collaborative. It was kind. It was

1 loving. We had a lot of grace and empathy. And I 2 appreciate that out of all of you, because it really did 3 take all of us working together to not just get things 4 done but to have a very positive, encouraging and 5 leadership role that we showed this week. So that's all 6 thanks to you.

7 I also want to thank all the volunteers 8 that put all of this together. We're going to be 9 thanking them throughout this whole assembly, but it 10 literally took thousands of man-hours to put this 11 together and like over 200 volunteers. So this was 12 truly a body of teamwork like no other because this 13 can't be done by one or two people. It takes a village. 14 So we're raising CFP.

15 I do want to say that active involvement 16 is increasingly important. Many of us have had a tough 17 three years, right, personally, professionally? We've 18 lost people, things. We've had a huge attrition rate in 19 our profession as a whole. It doesn't matter what side 20 of the aisle you're sitting on, we've all seen just kind 21 of that turnover rate and that high pressure on all of 22 And it takes coming together and encouraging one us. 23 another to keep engaged and to keep that spirit of food 24 safety alive. And I know we talk about food safety 25 culture a lot in an industry, but it really is our food

4 I was recently at a training and sitting in a room of other health professionals who were in 5 6 leadership positions. And as you go around and talk 7 about what you do in your daily life, the physical therapist and the occupational health people in the 8 9 room, there was that aha moment of wait, every single 10 one of us has to eat and drink every single day of our 11 That means your job affects everybody every lives. 12 single day. I want you to remember that, okay? We make 13 a huge impact in the world and we need to continue 14 making that impact. And what I've seen this week is we 15 can do it. We've got the spirit. We've got the 16 passion. We can continue to make change and encourage 17 new leaders to get involved, okay? So I want new 18 leaders in here in two years when we come to Denver. 19 So, as a reminder, we're at the -- and Dave wrote it 20 down for me because I don't have that good of a 21 memory -- we are at the Westin -- or, no, the Hyatt --22 The Westin Galleria. MR. MCSWANE: The Westin Galleria in Denver 23 MS. VOUGHT: 24 in 2025. 25 MR. MCSWANE: No, Grand Hyatt. I'm sorry.

1 Grand Hyatt. 2 Yeah. MS. VOUGHT: Okay. Grand Hyatt. MR. MCSWANE: Don't come back here in '25. 3 4 We won't be here. 5 MS. VOUGHT: We're all a little braindead, 6 Okay. So, you know, come back in 2025 and bring right? 7 a friend. And in the meantime, and I still have some buttons, wear your buttons. And I actually want to make 8 9 a little game out of it. So if you know somebody who 10 has a button and you see them at another conference and 11 they're not wearing that button at the other conference to kind of encourage CFP and people to talk about it, 12 13 maybe you should challenge them that they have to buy 14 you a drink because they're not wearing a button. Let's 15 make it fun, right? 16 So keep talking. Keep talking. Keep 17 Keep trying to get people involved. engaged. We're 18 going to have committee sign-ups coming up. New members 19 can pay for membership and be involved in committees. 20 Those that are live-streaming have registered biennial 21 meeting so you're automatically a member and can 22 participate in committees that are coming up as well as 23 all of you in the room. So get involved, keep engaged, 24 get involved, keep talking about CFP because I think 25 it's really, really important work.

22	do want to now turn the podium over to our Executive
23	Director, Dr. McSwane, so he can do the role call for
24	the assembly.
25	MR. MCSWANE: Well, good morning,

1 This is obviously the last event on our everyone. 2 weeklong journey of the 2023 Biennial Meeting, but this is probably one of the most if not the most important 3 4 session of all because this is where all of the issues 5 that have been vetted by council are now considered by 6 the assembly. And they're really the final gatekeepers 7 of what goes forward and what doesn't. So I appreciate 8 not only the participation of the assembly members 9 themselves. The delegates and the states are well 10 representing. But I appreciate the audience as well so 11 that you're sticking around to see that the culmination 12 of the end of the week and the CFP process as a whole. 13 So with that, as I read the name of your state, I'd like for you to respond by indicating your

14 15 name, the name of the agency that you are representing, 16 as well as the share of the vote you have. So, in other 17 words, I would say, "I'm Dave McSwane. I represent the 18 Conference for Food Protection and I have one vote." 19 For those states that are represented by more than one 20 agency, you will have a half vote usually if there's 21 two. I don't think we have any situations this year 22 where we have three agencies within a single state. So 23 it should be either a one-half vote or one full vote as 24 the case might be.

And you will be in the 11 interim calculating what will constitute simple majority 12 and two-thirds majority based upon those numbers. 13 Caucus elections, as you know, were held 14 during the course of the meetings on Wednesday afternoon 15 for positions on the Executive Board for a six-year 16 term. The following individuals were elected. The 17 State Regulatory Representative from the Midwest Region 18 is Becky Vought and Ann Johnson with the Florida 19 Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services will be 20 representing the Southeast Region. So, again, congratulations to both of those individuals. 21 22 In the Local Regulatory Representative 23 category Sarah Jensen with the Franklin County Public 24 Health Department in Columbus, Ohio was re-elected to a 25 six-year term for the Mid-Atlantic Region and Mike

5	In the Industry at Large position,
б	Allison Jennings with Albertsons Companies was elected
7	as the At Large member by the industry caucus.
8	And Michelle Hill with Allergen Free
9	Cooking in Woodbury, Minnesota was elected as our
10	Consumer representative to the Board for a six-year
11	term.
12	In addition, your Executive Board has
13	affirmed the appointment of the following individuals
14	who will be serving as Council Vice-Chairs at the 2025
15	Biennial Meeting in Denver and obviously in the interim
16	as well. For Council I it will be Barry Parsons with
17	Cenza, Inc., Council II is Kenesha Williamson with
18	Publix and Council III is Amanda Garvin who is with the
19	Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural
20	Development.
21	I also want to advise you that the next
22	Biennial Meeting will, in fact, since I do know this, is
23	going to be in March 24th through the 28th, 2025 in
24	Denver, Colorado. We will be at the Grand Hyatt as
25	opposed to the Westin Galleria as I said earlier, so

1 please make sure you go to the right place. Put these 2 dates down now. Block out the week. Hopefully we'll 3 see all of you and bring a friend. We'd like to have --4 I think this has been an exciting week and we all were 5 ready to get back to an in-person event. And I think 6 we've all enjoyed the opportunity to renew acquaintances 7 and hopefully meet new friends while you have been here 8 throughout the week.

9 And last but not least, I'm going to read 10 the following statement as required by our constitution 11 and bylaws. And as it says, and I quote, A quorum must 12 be present. A quorum is defined as the presence of 13 registered voting delegates from at least two-thirds of 14 the states with designated official delegates in 15 attendance at the conference meeting. Each territory and the District of Columbia shall count as one-half 16 17 States in the count in the quorum constitutes a vote. 18 single vote. A two-thirds majority is required to 19 change a procedure adopted at a previous conference or 20 to make changes to our constitution and bylaws. Other 21 actions require a simple majority, unless covered 22 otherwise by Robert's Rules of Order. The voting 23 choices are as follows: Yes, no or abstain. A council 24 recommendation cannot be changed by the assembly of 25 delegates. Votes are cast by the delegates using a show

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1	of hands. Roll call votes are taken only if requested
2	by a delegate.
3	Thank you, Madam Chairman.
4	MS. VOUGHT: Thank you, Dave, and thank
5	you to our assembly of delegates, all of our states,
6	territories and District of Columbia. So thank you for
7	joining us this morning.
8	Now I want to recognize Cliff Nutt. He's
9	going to give our Executive Treasurer's Report. Thank
10	you, Cliff.
11	MR. NUTT: Thank you, Becky. Hi, y'all.
12	How's everybody doing. You know, being from Oklahoma, I
13	do love coming to Texas, only because my wife is a fifth
14	generation Texan. But besides that, I hope everybody
15	had a great time here in Houston. The attendance of
16	this year's conference was 518. The attendance during
17	our April workshop which covered a variety of topics
18	related to the theme of "A Deep Dive into the Science
19	Behind the Issues" was 294.
20	I'd like to recognize a few entities and
21	organizations that are very instrumental in making this
22	event possible. Number one is the Food and Drug
23	Administration. You know, their sponsorship of CFP
24	through a \$50,000 small conference grant made it
25	possible to support 50 state and local regulatory

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1 agencies or attendees to attend with the registration 2 subsidy and they also helped the cost of our livestream 3 platform to allow people to participate remotely. Second, I'd like to call attention to the 41 national 4 5 and local Sustaining Sponsors, three Event/Service 6 donors and one Sustaining supporter who contributed over 7 \$132,000 to make this conference a success. And lastly, I'd like to recognize the efforts of the Texas LAC local 8 9 sponsors who supported CFP.

10 Our overall financial picture is in very 11 good shape. The CFP '22 ending cash balance was 12 \$553,747. The 2023 projected ending balance is 496,000. 13 So we're in excellent shape financially going forward. 14 Our financial reports, past and present, and current 15 biennial budget and also -- well, they're all posted on 16 the CFP website. And you can find that at 17 foodprotect.org.

18 With that, I conclude my remarks and wish 19 y'all safe travels.

20 MS. VOUGHT: Okay. Thank you, Cliff. As 21 I said, Cliff is the one who keeps us all fine 22 financially and he's done an excellent job. 23 All right. A few housekeeping items that

All right. A few housekeeping items that we have now before we begin the real business that we're here this morning for, so hopefully we'll be able to

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1 move through real quickly.

2 If a delegate wants to raise their hand 3 and be recognized by the Chair before speaking that 4 would be great. I would prefer that people use the 5 microphone so that we can hear your name, agency and 6 state. We're going to try and progress with that. Ιt 7 might help if we know we're going to make motions and 8 seconds to start proceeding to the microphone and kind 9 of get in line or any discussion points, okay? Ιf 10 someone wants to recognize a speaker from the audience, 11 you would then do the same, address me as the 12 Chairperson and then I will recognize that person that 13 you would like to recognize.

In tradition, to keep things moving along in case we have extracted issues this morning, I'd like to limit the debate on those extracted issues. So if I can get a motion and a second from my assembly members up here in the first four rows. A motion to limit debate, I would say, ten minutes total with speaker getting two minutes.

MS. WHEELER: Okay. I'd like -- I'm Angie Wheeler with Minnesota Department of Health and I'd like a motion to limit the debate to ten minutes with two minutes per speaker.

matter to limit debate?

MS. VOUGHT: Okay. So that motion moves
forward.
Okay. So we're going to be limiting
debate today on any extracted issues to ten minutes per
issue with two minutes per speaker.
Okay. Now, at this time I want to bring
up our lead parliamentarian, Belinda Clifton, who has
the fun job of keeping us all in line today.
MS. CLIFTON: We're definitely going to
try. Thank you, Madam Chair.
Good morning, everyone. My name is
Belinda Clifton, and I am the lead parliamentarian for
this year's CFP Biennial Meeting. I know that most of

you, if not all of you, have attended an orientation session for the delegates that was held last night. Many of you have been delegates at previous biennial meetings, but some of you are new delegates this year so we're going to go over a few things on how this is going to proceed.

7 Madam Chair, we do have a quorum. There 8 are 43 states represented today, the District of 9 Columbia and one territory for a possible vote of 44. 10 If we take the 44, the full majority vote will be 23 and 11 our two-thirds vote will be 30, which would be required 12 for any bylaw changes. And my assistant over there, 13 Mr. Michael Antee, has made sure that those numbers are 14 correct.

15 So the way this will work is each Council 16 Chair will present their Council's recommendations one 17 by one. Each Council Chair's report will have two parts 18 except for Council II, which will have three parts. I 19 believe we discussed that last night. And I will go 20 over what each of these parts will mean now.

So Part I for Council's report will be the affirmative recommendations that came for that council. These would be the votes or the recommendations that the outcome was accepted as submitted or accepted as amended.

1 Part II of the report will be the negative 2 recommendations. These will be the outcomes of the 3 council's deliberations that ended in recommendations 4 for no action being taken on the issue with the comments 5 for no action. 6 In Council II there will be a third part 7 of the report. Part III of Council's II's report will 8 contain all of the recommendations, whether affirmative 9 or negative recommendations, for the changes to the CFP 10 Constitution and Bylaws. We have broken out these 11 changes into Part III of Council II's report because 12 they require a two-thirds vote. So at that point we 13 will be taking probably a hand count to make sure that 14 we meet the two-thirds requirement. Everything else 15 that you're going to vote on for this morning requires a 16 majority vote and those will more likely be done 17 vocally, okay? If Madam Chair does not sense a majority 18 vote, she'll ask for a hand count and we will take care 19 of that also, okay? 20 The Council Chairs will explain how many 21 issues that they've had that received an affirmative 22 vote, those issues accepted as submitted or amended. 23 After that the Council Chairs will begin the voting

24 process. The Chair will start by saying, "Are there any 25 issues that need to be extracted?" As we explained, to

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1 extract an issue, you raise your hand and be recognized, 2 state your name and your affiliation, followed by 3 statements such as, Madam Chair, I would like to extract 4 issue number and state the number and Council that it 5 came from.

We will extract all of those issues and those extracted issues will be deliberated one by one in order that they appear in the order of the numbers assigned to the council. For all other issues that are not extracted, we will vote on them as a block.

The chair will ask for a motion and the motion will be to accept the council's recommendations for all of the issues that are not extracted. There will be second and then you will vote on those issues. A vote of yes means that you agree with the council's recommendations. A vote no means you do not agree with the council's recommendations.

18 Now, as we've said, I can't tell you how 19 to vote, but typically if you don't agree with the 20 council's recommendations for any particular issue, you 21 will have already decided that you are going to extract that issue and take that action. Be mindful that you're 22 23 voting on all remaining issues as a block. So if you 24 vote no for the first vote that means that you don't 25 agree with any of the council's recommendations

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1 whatsoever.

2 The councils and their committees have 3 done a lot of work for you guys. So then what we will 4 do is after you vote on those by the block, we will 5 consider the extracted issues one by one. The Chair 6 will call for a motion. The motion will have to be, 7 "Madam Chair, I move to accept the council's 8 recommendations on that particular issue that is being 9 extracted." So you need to name the number. That must 10 be seconded. And the reason we do that is because we 11 have to get to a discussion mode as in the parliamentary 12 procedures. At that point then you can discuss the 13 After discussion you have the time limit to issue. 14 discuss and then we can speak to the extracted issue. 15 And again, like I said, the information that you speak to on the issue has to be pertinent to 16

10 that you speak to on the issue has to be pertinent to 17 not accepting or accepting the council's recommendation 18 on the issue. It will be out of order for you to speak 19 to the merits of the issue itself. We will make sure 20 that you stay in order in that regard.

You voted previously to limit discussion to any particular issues to ten minutes total and two minutes per speaker. I will be keeping track of time and I assume Michael Antee will be doing that for us. And you may also call on someone from the

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audience to speak. You would need to ask the Chair to
recognize a particular person and there affiliation in
order to do that. That person needs to step up to the
microphone and state their name and affiliation and then
they can state their comments into the record.

Part II of the report, as I've said 6 7 before, will be the no actions. Those would be the 8 negative recommendations that came from the council. 9 The same thing goes there, you will have an opportunity 10 to extract those issues that you would like to discuss. 11 And as I've said, if you vote yes for an extracted issue 12 that you chose to extract and discuss, that means that 13 you agree with the council's recommendations. If you 14 vote no, that means that you did not agree with the 15 council's recommendations. Those issues that recommend 16 no action that are voted no by the Assembly will be sent 17 back to the Executive Board for further consideration. 18 If you vote no on the Part I issues, the affirmative issues, that means that issue will receive no further 19 20 action at this time. Are there any questions? Thank 21 you.

22

Madam Chair.

23 MS. VOUGHT: Thank you, Belinda. And I 24 know many of you are new, so we'll get through this 25 together. It's okay if we don't get it right the first

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time. We'll get it right the second time, and that's 1 2 all that matters. 3 And again, instead of raising hands, 4 because we have the livestream and transcription going, 5 it's best that when we make motions and seconds if we 6 line up at the microphone, as well as extractions and 7 the two-minute talks. So that's better not done there because you guys don't have individual mics at your 8 9 seats, okay? 10 All right. Thank you, Madam Chair. 21 I do MR. ROSSOW: want to extend a thank you for Tom McMann for his 22 23 service. I know he would really love to be here. 24 I'd like to start by saying it has been an 25 honor and a privilege to serve as Chair as Council I.

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1 Any success or praise for the work of the council, I 2 share happily with my Vice Chair, Rodney Blanchard, the 3 council members and council alternates who have 4 diligently studied and deliberated all 32 issues 5 presented to the council. We would like to have -- we 6 would not have completed this work without the 7 dedication and commitment of our scribe, Felicia Irving; 8 parliamentarian, Travis Jensen; runner, Rafael Morales; 9 and our amazing council members. 10 Three of our issues were moved to Council 11 III, two of our Council II issues were transferred to 12 Council 1 and then one was transferred back to 13 This left Council I with 30 issues to Council II. 14 deliberate, resulting in recreating two committees, the 15 Allergen Committee and the Plan Review Committee, and 16 creating two new committees, the Complex Vending Units 17 Committee and the E-Commerce Committee. 18 The first part of my report is as follows. 19 In summary, there were three issues accepted as 20 submitted and ten issues accepted as amended for a total 21 of 13 affirmative issues that came out of Council I. 22 Those are listed in your Council I submissions. 23 Thank you for your attention. 24 I feel like I'm getting a MS. VOUGHT: 25 work out this morning.

4	history as to why this provision was included in the
5	first place and why it should be removed from our code.
6	And as much as I appreciate the efforts of the of our
7	colleagues on Council I and the work that they put into
8	it, I think unfortunately that they missed the mark a
9	little on this particular issue.
10	Immediately out of the gate this was moved
11	to no action. And there was discussion about the issue,
12	but, frankly, it's redundant. There's already a
13	provision that states that if there is some source of
14	contamination to food, food contact services, equipment,
15	packaging, that you can cite that. And, frankly, there
16	was good reason to go ahead and take that specific
17	language for leaking sprinklers out of the code. And I
18	felt like it was a disservice to our colleagues, our
19	professional colleagues, in a similar organization. And
20	I feel like it was sort of an easy win. And I feel like
21	we would be in a good position to send this to the Board
22	and ask them to consider it and potentially sort of put
23	out an olive branch to our colleagues for something
24	that's redundant in the code.

And I 4 definitely want to extend my gratitude and thanks to 5 our Vice Chair, Wendy Bell; our parliamentarian, 6 Michael Antee; our scribe, Katita Grice; and our runner, 7 Ginger Points. They all did a fantastic job. 8 Without a doubt Council II maintained the 9 spirit of the conference in considering and respecting 10 the opinions of all of the food safety stakeholders and 11 the constituencies that were represented. We worked 12 hard to put our first-time issue submitter's and 13 presenters at ease with the deliberation process and to 14 prioritize education on each issue with a goal of 15 obtaining consensus. We received a total of 53 issues. 16 I think as you heard we had transferred two to Council I 17 and one of those came back to us. So we deliberated a 18 total of 52 issues and we created three committees in 19 Council II. One of those is a council committee on Food 20 Safety Culture. And then there were two standing 21 committees created. One on Food Safety Management 22 Systems and the second one was the CFP Technology 23 Solutions standing committee. And out of our 24 affirmative issues, there were a total of 43 issues 25 accepted as submitted or accepted as amended.

15	is that improper cooling practices are significant cause
16	of food born illness and that proper cooling of foods is
17	difficult to achieve in a food service setting.
18	We've also heard testimony from industry
19	partners who have used this method and have found it to
20	be overwhelmingly affective as well as Washington State
21	who coded this decades ago. They have not had a single
22	outbreak related to this method. I encourage us to
23	trust the methods and vote to keep this issue. Thank
24	you.

13	has been a safe and easy method to teach as it helps
14	workers shift focus on visual parameters. Council III
15	met with multiple numbers of Council III supported the
16	science we provided in our issue. We also heard from
17	Washington State who has had (inaudible) for over 30
18	years and the number of (inaudible) outbreaks in their
19	state had dramatically decreased due to this method.
20	This language is a step in the right direction. Thank
21	you.
22	MS. VOUGHT: Nancy.
23	MS. DIERSEN: I'd like to take one more
24	opportunity to reach out to all the smarter people in
~ -	

25 the room during this new era of smarter food safety

because the fact is people you can do this thing already 1 under the current structure of the food code and without 2 3 continuous monitoring because the food code only speaks 4 to routine monitoring of food stirring the cooling 5 So let's not muddy the cooling methods section process. 6 of the food code as this current recommended language 7 would do and it does with this new Section C and its 8 must language that currently contradicts all the seven 9 methods allowed in Section A. And it adds this new 10 term, after additional validation, that's just going to 11 cause us to come back in two years and ask FDA for a definition of what that means. So let's build a strong 12 13 food safety culture and promote active managerial 14 control instead of turning our inspection staff into the 15 2-inch food police who now have to carry a food grade 16 multiuse ruler. Let's act smarter. Let's go home and 17 do our job and educate facilities. You can do this if 18 you want to and FDA said so at CFP. We do not need this 19 It's just going to lead to perhaps amended language. 20 unanticipated consequences when FDA perhaps says that 21 now we need written procedures for this validation, 22 which is going to lead to one more requirement on the 23 PIP to maintain documentation for written procedures 24 after they conduct their initial validation. 25 MS. VOUGHT: Okay, Nancy. Thank you.

11	Secondly, when it comes to this study as
12	well and our also proposes language is that 2-inch
13	measurable depth for their right now I have
14	facilities that can't even find a thermometer when
15	you're asking them to and now you're asking them to have
16	a ruler or a way to measure the depth of food. And the
17	reason why the depth of food is important is the studies
18	actually say that even an inch of just 1 inch more,
19	3 inches, proves that in that study that cooling was not
20	able to be met. So we're only looking at a 1-inch
21	variable here. So a 1-inch variable is not enough in my
22	opinion based on all the other things that are going on
23	when we're trying to go get smarter when it comes to it.
24	And this is my last comment. I've heard
25	it three times yet today. I have a really bad taste in

1 my mouth when I hear people say cooling is hard and 2 that's why we want to change the rule. Because it's 3 already allowed. Cooling is hard. Yes, it is. But 4 let's not change the rule because it's hard. If they 5 don't want to cool, they don't have to cool. Thank you. 6 MS. SHELTON: Good morning. Susan Shelton 7 with Washington State Department of Health. I wanted to 8 thank the Minnesota Department of Health for bringing 9 this issue forward. I also wanted to thank all of the 10 input that we received and discussions on both councils, 11 Council I and II. 12 In coming here I had no idea this was 13 going to be such an issue. 13 So thank you for all your hard work this 14 We had two new parliamentarians that had not done week. 15 this ever before, Travis and Angela. I think they did a 16 wonderful job, as you all do. And it was such a 17 pleasure to get to know you all and spend some time with 18 you all. So thank you for your service to CFP. They do 19 this as volunteers and they don't get to have nearly the 20 fun that we have. They have to be the hard line. So we 21 appreciate that work. So thank you.

So, second, I want to recognize and give a resolution to our Issues Chairs. It's a unique position that's behind the scenes. This year we did do something unique and we have an Issues Chair, Patrick Guzzle, and
